

Set in present-day Washington, D.C., House of Cards is the story of Frank "Francis" Underwood, a Democrat from South Carolina's 5th congressional district and House Majority Whip who, after being passed over for appointment as Secretary of State, initiates an elaborate plan to get himself into a position of greater power, aided by his wife, Claire Underwood. The series deals primarily with themes of ruthless pragmatism, manipulation and power.

Zoe: Donald Blythe?


Frank: Correct. The problem is...

1. **do the math** (verb)

- to figure something out especially when the answer is obvious Ex: *Did closing thirty beds hurt emergency waiting times? You do the math!*

2. **tax-and-spend** (adjective <before noun>)

- a party, government, etc. that increases taxes to spend on public services Ex: *They remained committed to their tax-and-spend philosophy.*

3. gray area (noun)

an area of uncertainty

Ex: The responsibility for social studies in that college is a gray area. Several departments are involved.

4. **be in the same boat** (as someone)

- be in the same (unpleasant) situation

Ex: If he loses his job, he'll be in the same boat as any other unemployed person.

5. **tip over** (verb)

to cause something to overturn

Ex: The wind tipped over the sailboat.
