- absolutely; without further complication or elaboration

Ex: She's a genius, plain and simple.

### 2. open a can of worms

to create a situation that will cause trouble

Ex: Her plan will surely open a can of worms.

#### 3. **cut down** (verb)

to decrease or reduce

Ex: I need to cut down on shopping.

#### 4. the thin edge of the wedge

- the start of a harmful development

Ex: Most of them see the shutdown of the factory the thin edge of the wedge.



## 5. have (something) in mind

to be thinking about something as a possibility

Ex: Let's eat out. Where do you have in mind?
