Vocabulary

1. poison [**poi**-zuh n] noun

- a substance with an inherent property that tends to destroy life or impair health

Sample:

For many centuries, South Americans had killed their victims with poison arrows that paralyzed muscles.

2. holler [**hol**-er]*verb* (*used without object*)

- to cry aloud; shout; yell

Sample:

Quit **hollering** into the phone.

3. camp [kamp] *noun*

- a place where an army or other group of persons or an individual islodgedin a tent or tents or other temporary means of shelter

Sample:

Students head out from dorms to become interns, caddies, and camp counselors.

4. wander [**won**-der] *verb* (used without object)

- to ramble without a definite purpose or objective; roam, rove, or stray

Sample:

Before proceeding to the next paragraph, let your mind wander wherever it wants to go.

5. distance [**dis**-tuh ns] noun

- the extent or amount of space between two things, points, lines, etc.

Sample:

The researchers identified a range of physical traits that suggest human ancestors evolved as **distance** runners.
