## Season 1 Episode 3 “Tell It to the Frogs”

*Camp. Lori is giving Carl a haircut.*

**Carl:** Eww!

**Shane:** No, yum!

**Lori:** No, he's right. Eww.



# VOCABULARY

1. **fidget** /'fɪdʒ ɪt/ *verb*

- to move about restlessly, nervously, or impatiently

*I usually **fidget** when I'm bored.*

2. **sting** /stɪŋ/ *verb*

- to cause to suffer keenly in the mind or feelings

*Those harsh words **stung** me.*

3. **chuckle** /'tʃʌkəl/ *verb* (used without object), **chuckled, chuckling.**

- to laugh softly or amusedly, usually with satisfaction,

*They **chuckled** at the child's efforts to walk.*

4. **dignity** /'dɪɡnɪti/ *noun, plural dignities.*

- bearing, conduct, or speech indicative of self-respect or appreciation of the formality or gravity of an occasion or situation

*There is **dignity** in honest labor.*

5. **unsure** /ʌn'ʃʊə/ *adjective*

- lacking assurance or self-confidence; without sure knowledge

*He is **unsure** of his response when he was asked.*
