- **Caroline:** I was on the couch and I heard you crying alone in your bedroom.
- **Max:** Really? What did the crying sound like? Like I wasn't crying.
- **Caroline:** Well, then what were you d-Oh! So, none of my business.
 - **Max:** That's right. And remember that.

VOCABULARY

buzz /bəz/ noun (informal): A general sense of excitement about or interest in someone or something, as reflected in or generated by media coverage or word of mouth

• Example: They created a huge buzz with their latest album.

mocking /mpk/ (verb): to behave with scorn or contempt (towards); show ridicule

Example: The other students are mocking the way he speaks.

lifeline / laɪf laɪn/ (noun): something, esp. a way of getting help, on which you depend.

Example: Airplanes are this Alaskan town's lifeline.

move in /muːv/ (phrasal verb): to go to a different place and begin to live or work there

• Example: High business taxes prevent new businesses from moving in.

breakup /'breɪkˌʌp/ (noun): the ending of a personal, especially a romantic, relationship.

• Example: The planned **breakup** of the company will give him a less important role.
